

Hun, Dudeck live in moment

WEST WINDSOR — When you talk to former athletes about reflecting back on their careers, one of the most common regrets brought up is the fact that they may not have taken the time to properly relish the memorable moments.

Brendan Dudeck and the rest of the Hun football team made sure that wouldn't be the case last Saturday.

After Dudeck found Chris Alston in the end zone for the winning score to cap a stunning come-from-behind 13-10 win over rival Peddie, the players made sure it would be a moment they wouldn't forget.

"Everybody was jumping on everybody," Dudeck said. "It was the greatest feeling ever. After we were done celebrating, we all laid on the field because we wanted to make sure it was a feeling that we remembered for the rest of our lives."

For his efforts, Dudeck was honored as the Offensive Back of the Week last night at the 12th Man Touchdown Club at the Boat-house Marina at Mercer County Park.

West Windsor-Plainsboro South's Zach Hundertmark (Offensive Lineman of the Week), Princeton's Trevor Barsamian (Defensive Lineman of the Week), Lawrenceville's Matt Netta (Defensive Back of the Week) and Notre Dame's George Solujich (Special Teams Player of the Week) were also honored.

Hundertmark, a standout two-way lineman who will continue his football career at the University of Louisville next year, was instrumental on both sides of the ball as West Windsor-Plainsboro South remained in NJSIAA Group IV

Central playoff contention with a 39-13 win over Nottingham.

"We knew they were a great passing team," Hundertmark said of Nottingham. "We knew our (defensive) backs were up for the test but we knew that we could make the job a lot easier on them if we were able to pressure the quarterback. I really have to credit all the guys up front for doing a great job with that."

Barsamian rushed for a season-high 95 yards and hit paydirt twice as Princeton trounced Valley division foe Hightstown, 30-6. In both the win over Hightstown and the win over West Windsor-Plainsboro North a few weeks back, Barsamian would have surpassed the 100-yard plateau along with backfield mate Josh Gordon had it not been for unnecessary penalties that negated long touchdown runs.

Netta, along with fellow line-backer Patrick Skov, led a strong performance by the Lawrenceville defense in a 12-10 win — the Big Red's first over Blair since 2006.

Solujich, the Colonial Valley Conference's top kicker, was back on the offensive line in the 37-7 win over WW-P North Saturday after getting cleared to resume contact following offseason shoulder surgery.
